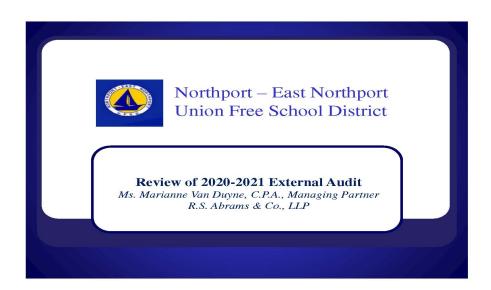

NEW AND FUTURE ACCOUNTING STANDARDS

New Accounting Standard:

• The District implemented GASB Statement No. 84, Fiduciary Activities, during the 2020-21 fiscal year, which provides guidance for identifying fiduciary activities, primarily based on whether the government is controlling the assets, and the beneficiaries with whom the fiduciary relationship exists, and on how different fiduciary activities should be reported. The adoption and implementation of this statement resulted in the restatement of opening fund balance and net position in the amount of 334,037.

Future Accounting Standard:

• GASB has issued Statement No. 87, Leases, effective for fiscal year ended June 30, 2022. This Statement establishes a single model for lease accounting based on the idea that leases are financings of the right-to-use an underlying asset. As such, under this Statement, a lessee is required to recognize a lease liability and an intangible right-to-use lease asset, and the lessor is required to recognize a lease receivable and a deferred inflow of resources.

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REVIEW OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

*Fund balance for 2020 was restated to include a special revenue fund for scholarships and donations and extraclassroom activities due to the implementation of GASB Statement No. 84, *Fiduciary Activities*. This restatement resulted in an increase in prior year ending fund balance of \$334.037

- Total fund balance in the general fund increased by \$4,315,431 due to the excess of revenues and other financing sources over expenditures and other financing uses.
- The restricted fund balance in the general fund increased \$4,606,139 due to the allocation of interest of \$16,330, plus transfers of \$2,000,000 into the 2018 capital reserve, \$2,000,000 into the 2021 capital reserve, and \$1,621,530 into the retirement contribution reserve, offset by the use of the employee benefit accrued liability reserve of \$750,000, workers' compensation reserve of \$140,000, and the retirement contribution reserve of \$141,721.
- The decrease in the fund balance of the school food service fund was \$28,838. This was due to
 an operating loss of \$208,874 offset by a general fund subsidy of \$180,036.
- The increase in the fund balance of the capital projects fund of \$35,316,185 was primarily due
 to the issuance of general obligation serial bonds to fund capital projects, offset by capital
 project expenditures during the year.

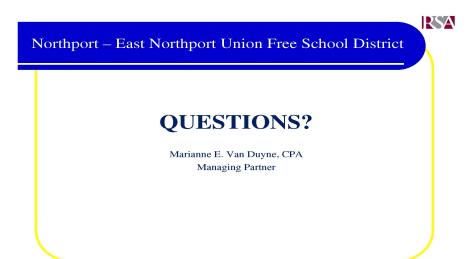

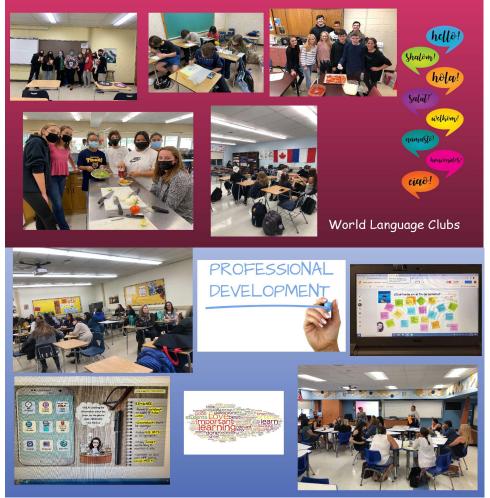

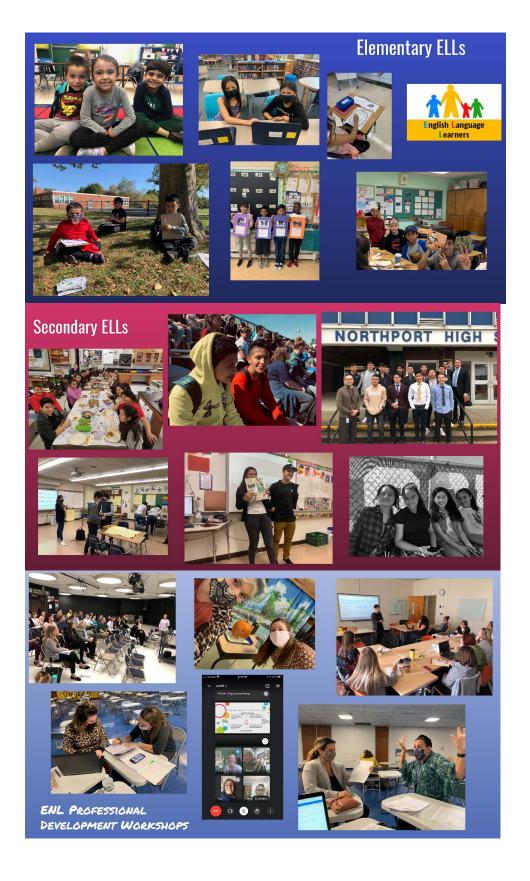
