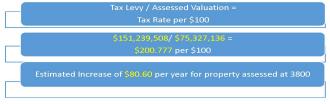

Name Comment

Christina Karman Asked about the decrease of 19.8% in core education and why there is a bus

purchase in the budget when the district has not received the buses that were

purchased the last two years.

Mr. Howard stated that the elementary level teaching has a budget reduction because it is now budgeted in the middle schools as the 5th grade was moved to the middle schools. The District should be receiving the buses that were purchased within the next month or so. The delay was due to supply change issues. The buses being replaced are about 25 years old and the recommendation is to replace one each year and make sure we are proactive in fleet maintenance.

Nicole Raganella Stated that we are getting \$1 million from the power plant relief fund and \$2

> million from LIPA and would like to see that money relieve the taxpayers. Would like to see an accounting of the savings the District had by closing the two buildings. Stated that the Board needs to start looking at the budget to budget

increases and costs and that the budget could clearly be reduced.

Denise Schwartz Stated she is concerned about the actual savings from closing Bellerose and

> Dickinson Avenue Schools. There is no reason for the District to be using both buildings. There is a lot of potential for revenue from leasing and/or selling the schools. Asked what is going on with the long range financial planning

committee.

Mr. Banzer stated that the committee is not focusing on this year's budget. Their work is to look at trends, where we are going and what the impact would be. The committee is future focused. At the end of the committee's work, they will present a report to the Board and community.
